OUR FIRST TWO YEARS

- Enabled **4,800 young adults** to participate in immersive service programs
- Enabled **870 young adults** to participate in **service programs in Israel**, with another 750 joining in 2011-2012
- Mobilized **19,800 people** nationwide in Days of Service
- Launched campus-based service partnerships that engaged **1,800 students last year** at Cornell, UCLA, UC Berkeley, University of Maryland, University of Pennsylvania, University of Washington and Tufts
- Created Repair the World **college service-learning courses**, the first to be taught this fall at the University of Washington
- Launched **weRepair.org**, the go-to portal for Jewish volunteerism and service, and **RepairLabs.org**, a hub for educators and professionals
- Launched a multi-year **Pedagogy Project** to enhance recruitment, training, assessment and retention of Jewish service-learning educators
- Released *Volunteering + Values: A Report on Jewish Young Adults*, the first-ever study of the service-related attitudes and behaviors of American Jewish young adults
- Became the Jewish voice of the national service movement

We work with over 60 partners to create programs, make them more effective and visible, and to **spread the word**.
